This is our eighteenth annual report to the citizens of the town of Clarendon on State payments in your municipality of various types of assistance and welfare during 1953.

The total number of recipients in the State has remained stable for three years but expenditures are larger by reason of increases in payments authorized by the Legislature and increases in cost of services, including rent. Funds for the support of these programs were derived from the Federal and State Governments. The towns and cities participated financially in two of the programs as indicated below. Administrative expenses for the four types of Public Assistance were about 4.4 percent, the lowest in the North Atlantic States and among the lowest in the nation.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINDENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Directors and Citizens of the Town of Clarendon:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

BUDGET FOR 1954-1955

The budget for the next school year of 1954-1955 is presented on another page. You will note increases are provided in teachers' salaries, textbooks, and equipment. On June 30, 1953, the end of the school year 1952-1953, there was a deficit of \$525.36. At the close of the present school year, which will end June 30, 1954, there probably will be a similar deficit. The School Directors and I believe that your School Department needs an increase in the school tax for next year in order to avoid ending the school year with a deficit. Accordingly, we are recommending a tax of \$3.50 for the school year of 1954-1955.

BUILDING PROGRAM

On January 25, 1954, a public meeting was held at the Town Hall to discuss the building problems of the School District. At this meeting the results of the inspections of the State Department of Health and the Department of Safety were read. State Aid for construction was explained by Mr. Rupert Spencer of the State Department of Education. A Citizens Committee was appointed to meet with the School Directors to discuss the best course of action in regards to the school building situation. It is expected that some definite recommendations will be ready for presentation at the town meeting.

The children of Clarendon deserve the best school facilities that the town can afford to provide for them. We urge that the voters of the School District give serious consideration to the recommendations that will be made to them as a result of the study of the Citizens Committee and the School Directors.

REPORT OF WHITE PINE BLISTER RUST CONTROL WORK—TOWN OF CLARENDON 1953

At the Annual Town Meeting in March of 1953 the Town of Clarendon appropriated \$200 to be used in cooperation with State and Federal funds for white pine blister rust control work. This Town money was used during the period July 22 to 31 to help pay for blister rust control work in the Town. An average of five men were paid from Town funds during this period.

The work of this crew consisted of destroying currant and gooseberry bushes found growing within the white pine blister rust control zone. The control zone is the white pine stand and a protective zone around the stand from which currants and gooseberries must be removed to prevent the spread of blister rust in that locality.

Blister rust is a two host fungus disease which cannot spread unless both host plants, white pine trees and currant or gooseberry bushes, are growing in the same area. The 1953 work will prevent the spread of blister rust in these white pine areas for several years. After five to ten years these areas will be examined to determine the need for further work and, if found necessary, recommendations will be made for doing the required work.

Accomplishments of the 1953 eradication season, are as follows:

The 1953 season completed all work needed in Clarendon at this time. Some of the first areas worked in Clarendon in 1949 are scheduled for re-examination and probably some re-work in 1959. Until that time the Town of Clarendon will not be requested to appropriate funds for blister rust control work.

The cooperation of the Town of Clarendon in this work has been appreciated. We hope the cooperative program can be renewed when further efforts along this line are in order.
