Scientists have determined that this monument of Mongol Brahmi script existed some 1,400 years ago or 600 years before the so-called "Chinggis Strong Inscription", which is being preserved at the Hermitage in Russia. U.Khurelsukh, Prime Minister of Mongolia graced the ceremony of depositing the engravings in the Government House. The Prime Minister underlined that the ceremony consolidates the spirit and immunity of the mother tongue and culture, and on behalf of the Government and on his personal behalf, he thanked all the individuals and organizations that are

involved in determining that the Khuis tolgoi is historical evidence of the Mongolian language and a unique and valuable monument. A research team led by D.Tsend of the Institute of Language and Literature of the Academy of Sciences of the Mongolian People's Republic discovered three stone monuments with strange inscriptions from a place called Khuis Tolgoi in Mogod soum of Bulgan aimag in 1967. In 1972, they were studied by M. Shinkhuu, a research associate with the Institute of History of the Mongolian Academy of Sciences, who confirmed that the script was Brahmi letter.

Record books of Mongolian students at France's Lycée Michelet presented after 93 years

20 NOVEMBER, 2019 ULAANBAATAR



On November 18, Minister of Education, Culture, Science and Sports Yo.Baatarbileg visited the Lycée Michelet secondary school and Sorbonne University of France. At the meeting with Director of the Lycée Michelet Eric Biset invited Mongolian students to study at the Lycée Michelet, while mentioning that since 1930, no Mongolian has studied there. Afterwards, he handed over copies the of record books and photos of Mongolian students J.Dugersuren, L.Urtnasan, L.Namsrai and B.Ayurzana, who graduated from the school, from the school's archive to the Mongolian Education Minister. These students were accompanied by then-Minister of Education of the Mongolian People's Republic Erdenebatkhan and brought to Paris in 1926. During the mid-1920s, Mongolia sent the best 40 students of secondary schools to Germany and France, who later became leading intellectuals of scientific, cultural and industrial areas of Mongolia. With the school's authorities, Minister Yo.Baatarbileg talked about the possibilities of Mongolian students to study again at the Lycée Michelet after 93 years.

Documentary heritage to be preserved in digital form

Mongolian National Commission for UNESCO today has launched a training themed 'Preservation, protection of and access to documentary heritage' in partnership with the UNESCO Office in Beijing. The two-day training is being organized within the Memory of the World Program, which has been carried out since 1992. Impetus came originally from a growing awareness of the parlous state of preservation of and access to ocumentary heritage in various parts of the world. The

training intends to raise awareness and knowledge on UNESCO Recommendation concerning the Preservation of, Access to Documentary Heritage in the Digital Era, issued in 2015. It enables the attendees to discuss general principles on transformation of documentary heritage into digital form and its further preservation and protection. More than 20 specialists including researchers of archives, museums, universities and colleges are taking part in the training, having lectures of UNESCO experts.

Mongol Studies represents the most realistic promotion of Mongolia overseas and is special for it defines the issues that existed and that may crop up in the future in the history of the Mongols. Mongolian and foreign scholars presented at the conference papers on the following broad themes and subjects: History of religion and belief, their sensitive issues, and the Law on State and Religion; International assessment of the relationship between the state and religion in Mongolia; and, Bogd Khan and the contemporary khutugtus and reincarnates.

Mongolists gather for Asian regional conference in Seoul

The 3rd Asian Regional Conference of the International Association for Mongol Studies (IAMS) took place at the National Museum of Korea in Seoul, the Republic of Korea on November 8-9. Held under the theme 'Cultural heritage of Mongolia', the conference brought together 69 scholars and researchers from over 10 countries and officials of Mongolia and S.Korea.Scholars and researchers presented their works at six sessions including 'Policy and research on cultural heritage,' 'Mongolian archaeology' and others and exchanged views in detail with participants. It provided scholars, p particularly young researchers, an opportunity to receive a wide range of information. During the conference, a message of gratitude of the Mongolia's President Kh.Battulga was voiced to the participants. In the message, the President expressed his commitment to the promotion of Mongolian studies and requested active participation of all Mongolists and scholars in the celebration of the 800th anniversary of ancient capital--Karakorum in 2020 and the 12th International Congress of Mongolists in 2021.

International conference on sources of Mongol studies held in Beijing

nternational academic conference on Mongolian sources in countries along the Belt and Road took place last weekend in Beijing, China, bringing together more than 80 scholars and researchers of Mongol studies from some ten countries including Mongolia, China, Russia, Poland, Hungary, USA and France.

uring the opening ceremony of the conference, an event to commemorate the 80th birth anniversary of prominent scholar of Mongol studies Prof. Dr.

Ch.Khishigtogtokh, and a presentation of several publications, such as a photo album of sources of Mongol studies that have been kept in countries along the Belt and Road, an academic research series of such sources and a 50-volume book of Clear Script (Tod Useg) sources of Oirat Mongols kept in territories along the Ili River were organized.

Secretary General of the IAMS S.Chuluun said that the conference, as a platform to deliberate about the current state and future trends of historical source research, which plays an important part in Mongol studies, serves as a platform to introduce the accomplishments of a project to publish historical sources that have been preserved around the world, providing opportunities to Mongolist scholars to forward their works. "With a view to promote Mongol studies around the world, the IAMS has been organizing Asian and European regional conference every year. The first Asian conference was held in Beijing. In addition to this conference, another Asian regional conference is to be hosted in Seoul. South Korea with active participation of international scholars."

(Post)Socialism as a Global Resource

Is socialism back? It's hard to ignore a certain shifting of the political and discursive tides around the globe. Even in the US and Russia—exemplars of the "West" and the "former Soviet Bloc" *par excellence*—invocations of "socialism" are returning to popular political discourse as indices not merely of an irredeemable past but, increasingly, of mainstream political imaginaries. Historically, scholarship has explored a "postsocialist" condition wherein the "post-" often signifies a rupture from the socialism that preceded it, the burden of the past, and/or a transition to liberal normalcy at the "End of History." Extremely portable, that idea of the "postsocialist" has been operative in analyses of Lula's political demise, Post-Soviet Kyrgyzstan, market-driven China, Special Period Cuba, post-Ujamaa Tanzania, Chile after Allende.

Today, it may be productive to reevaluate what "postsocialism" is—stressing its organic *link* to socialism—rather than merely a *rupture* from it. Using the term (post)socialism, we take seriously this link. Neither simply a specter nor nostalgia, we imagine the "post-" in (post)socialism as a placeholder and a pause, a moment of opening for a space of inquiry, a site for the reappraisal of socialism. Could (post)socialism provide a *vantage point* from which we might open ourselves up to forms of life, ways of thinking, and modes of being in the world that become more apparent in light of the 1989 collapse of Soviet state socialism? Could (post)socialism, with its political, philosophical, and/or affective attachments to socialism, itself be a generative analytic? A methodology? The impulse of our conference is not to toss out "postsocialism" as triumphalist fantasy but to reclaim (post)socialism and its link to socialism as a position and a resource for genuine critical engagement—both in terms of analysis and political praxis.

Focusing on these new possibilities for (post)socialism, this conference brings together young scholars to take (post)socialism as a global resource for imagining alternatives (political, cultural, economic, etc.) to our present. While these topics are certainly of interest to students of the former USSR/socialist bloc, we do not limit our understanding of post-socialism to its usual geography. We invite submissions that engage these questions from across the globe—in/on "Western," "non-Western," and other contexts—as well as a variety of disciplinary and interdisciplinary perspectives including, but not limited to: anthropology, area studies, art history, critical theory, geography, history, literary studies, new media, performance studies, political theory, sociology, and science & technology studies.

Possible topics include, but are not limited to:

- · Global (post)socialisms, Internationalism and its legacies; post-socialism as a global condition
- · Critiques of neo/late liberalism, historicizing "the End of History," (Post)socialist studies of globalization
- · Alternative democratic futures drawing on (post)socialism, the free market and socialism
- Engagements between "2nd" and "3rd World;" Third-Worldism, the Non-Aligned movement, African Socialisms, Arab Socialisms, Latin American Socialisms
- · (Post)socialism and the black radical tradition, Afro-futurism, Afropessimisms, and/or the Black Atlantic traditions
- · (Post)socialist subjectivities, socialities, theologies, theories of life
- · (Post)socialist visual cultures, artistic practice, aesthesis; (Post)socialist art history, networks of cultural production
- · (Post)socialist mobilizations of memory, nostalgia, ressentiment, revisionist histories of the Cold War;
- · (Post)socialist Feminisms; sex and sexuality in the socialist world
- · Homosocialism, queer communism, queer optimism
- · Eco-socialism, environmental histories of (post)socialism, terraforming/infrastructural projects of socialism
- · (Post)socialist science and technology studies, histories of science from a (post)socialist perspective
