REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS FOR THE TOWN OF CLARENDON.

To the School Directors and Citizens:-

During the past year six schools have been maintained in town on the same general plan as in previous years. There has been a steady growth of work during the recent years we have reported. We are striving to give a training which shall be practically, not only that which shall fit the child to later get a living, but that which shall fit him to live; yet we feel that our work should be more related to home life. We urge that the boys take an interest in crop raising themselves, in the Corn Contest, etc. The scientific principles could be studied at school and much be done in domestic lines for the girls. One of the most important principles which should be instilled into the minds of our children is the right relation of education and work to real life.

The policies of our school work have been carefully outlined in previous reports, so we omit the discussion of them in this report. We are still working to reach the ideals which we have set.

Good schools depend, to a great extent, upon the successful teachers. Considering the high cost of living and the opportunities offered in other lines, salaries must be higher than formerly to secure good teachers, and to make an inducement for girls to take the necessary training and preparation for teaching. Salaries paid well trained efficient teachers is money well invested. Our earnest, successful teachers deserve commendation. The superintendent again recommends and urges that we have a graded system of salary scale which depends upon training and length and character of service. The pre-

sent system of salaries in this town fails to give proper inducement for growth.

A new floor has been laid in the Clarendon Springs school room and a new floor and ceiling in the East building. The two buildings in the north part of the town and the one in Chippenhook have been brightened and improved with a fresh coat of paint inside. This small expense has added much to the attractiveness to the school rooms. In general the buildings are in quite a good state of repair, but the underpinning of the Clarendon Springs building should be relaid next summer. New seats are much needed in the East Clarendon school room. We urge that these be supplied for the coming year. Some of the buildings will soon need painting outside.

Some of the schools are still lacking the flag and flag pole. We expect that these will be supplied this coming spring.

Only a few new books have been purchased this year. Three new unabridged dictionaries have been furnished the schools where most needed. We are to supply the schools with the much needed new Physiology and Hygiene books next term. Then the schools will be well supplied with good books. We find it hard to make books last as they should because of the hard usage children give them. We are trying to train for better use of books.

Since there are only two children in the East Street district, that school has been closed and those pupils transported to the other school. This makes very expensive education for these two, but it seems to be possible to make no other provision unless they should choose to transport themselves.

The school at North Clarendon has been very large. Though the teacher has done excellent work, it is impossible for one teacher to give a fair opportunity to so large a school with so many grades. The room is much overcrowded, and we sincerely hope that parents will some time awake to the need of giving their children the best possible opportunities and provide a two-room building for primary and grammar pupils.

A very promising class was graduated from the Elementary Course last June. The program was excellent and the attendance of parents and friends good. We were honored by having the State Superintendent of Education with us and giving a very inspiring address. These graduations are a very pleasing closing of our work, and serve as a strong impetus to encourage children to continue their school work until they finish the course. Let us do all we can to continue this encouragement. Several of the class are continuing their education in secondary schools.

Four teachers' meetings were held during the past year, and the time has been very profitably spent in consideration of school needs and better methods of instruction. One meeting of all teachers of the Union was held in North Clarendon. Another such meeting is planned for next May. An urgent invitation is extended to all parents and friends to be present and to help us in our study of what is best for the schools.

We would like to give some statistics showing school attendance, etc., but, as the school year does not close until the last of June, it is impossible at this time.

We are grateful to the parents for their support and interest in the schools. We urge them to visit the schools and see their daily work. Their presence would be encouraging, and any suggestion given will be helpful and gladly received.

We are glad that our school year is to be lengthened. This will give the children a much better opportunity, for they are expected to cover the same ground of work as those of towns about us which have four or five weeks longer school year.

The attention of parents is again called to the laws of school attendance, and to the fact that no child can enter school for the first time except in the beginning of the fall term.

The superintendent again thanks the parents, school

directors, and children for their help and courtesy. The child-dren have worked faithfully and well.
